FILM THE HOUSE IS A COMPETITION FOR UK-BASED STUDENT AND INDEPENDENT SCRIPTWRITERS, DIRECTORS AND FILMMAKERS, RUN IN Collaboration with Parliament.

Film the House was set up by the late former MP Mike Weatherley to educate parliamentarians and young people about the importance of the creative industries to the UK economy, and the many ways in which we can nurture and protect our creative industries.

This year's competition was sponsored by Lord Clement-Jones, Jo Stevens MP and Giles Watling MP. Entries were shared with local MPs, thereby giving parliamentarians an opportunity to engage with a grass-roots creative demographic and providing the creative community with a vehicle through which to communicate their issues to legislators.

Film the House provides a means for the UK creative industries to communicate the importance of protecting their intellectual property rights in a fun manner. It gives a foundation for parliamentarians to push hard to protect creative output, and for MPs' constituents to interact with their local MP (perhaps for the first time).

REMEMBERING MIKE WEATHERLEY

The person who has brought us all together is Mike Weatherley. As an MP, Mike created Film the House in 2012 to promote the British Film Industry: its contribution to creating 100,000 jobs in the UK and bringing billions of pounds into the UK economy.

Mike was a brilliant campaigner for the creative industries in the UK. More than that, he was my friend. I first met Mike, as a new MP, in 2010. A formal 30-minute meeting about age-rating music videos morphed into an 11-year friendship. A shared love of heavy metal and Iron Maiden t-shirts (one of which Mike did eventually smuggle into the Commons chamber, albeit under a regular shirt) cemented that friendship.

Over those all too short years, Mike and I spent countless hours talking music and film and relationships, attending gigs, and talking music and film some more. He was an incredibly kind man. He was loyal, supportive, and while he took his parliamentary duties very seriously indeed, he was always up for fun. It's hard to think of a more vivacious character, even when he was ill.

Not long before we lost Mike, he and I debated what would be our dream music festival line-up. Limited to five artists. Because in a dream you can set your own rules. After much toing and froing between us, Mike concluded that his would be Airbourne, Steel Panther, Stone Sour, Metallica, with Iron Maiden the headliners. All are bands that he championed, including bringing Satchel, Michael, Stix and Lexxi into Parliament – recorded in a video the BBFC had no option but to classify 18 – and appearing onstage with Maiden.

It seems to me that a fitting tribute to Mike would be for these bands to perform together in his memory. Perhaps Becky, who quite brilliantly organised a Film the House event once Mike had stepped down as an MP, could get them all together for the next Rock the House...

I miss Mike tremendously, as many of us do. I am so grateful to have known him. And I am sure he would love us to raise a glass to him today in memory of all his efforts to promote British film. Here's to Mike.

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

Each year, the creative industries contribute over £115billion to the UK economy and employ over two million people, making them the UK's fastest-growing sector. It is vital that we continue to support the creative industries to ensure all creators are fairly remunerated for their work and that their intellectual property (IP) is valued and protected.

WHY SHOULD WE PROTECT COPYRIGHT?

Copyright is about ownership. It's a law that says if you create something, you own it and you can decide what happens to it. If you can make money from what you create, there's a huge incentive to carry on creating. It's on this commonsense principle that the whole creative industries are founded. By protecting copyright and IP, we're ensuring the creative industries are protected too. **Lord Tim Clement-Jones:** "Intellectual property (IP) is a vital way of making sure that creators are properly rewarded for the artistic works they produce. This is as true for film and other visual media as it is for books, fashion or music.

Film the House is designed to highlight the importance we place in parliament on IP and on good IP protection and enforcement. We hope that for their part, creators will respond by taking part in future Film the House competitions and demonstrate the huge audiovisual and writing talent that we have in this country."
